The Division of Accounting and Auditing (A&A) website is a valuable resource of information for State Agencies, local governments, vendors, and our citizens. Earlier this year, we launched a project to revamp our website and make it a user friendly, intuitive place where information can be found easily. This project is now complete and you can view each phase of the website updates

here.

The project was completed in 3 phases. Phases 1 and 2 were completed in Fiscal Year 2023-2024. The recent changes were announced in <u>Agency</u> <u>Addressed Memorandum No. 11</u>.


- Phase Three
 - <u>Training Pages</u>: Consolidates trainings, job aids, meetings, and workshops provided by A&A .
 - <u>Division Calendar Page</u>: Lists trainings, workshops, and meetings hosted by the Division in a more user-friendly format.
 - <u>Sitemap</u>: Provides links for users to retrieve information quickly.
 - <u>Vendor & Provider Payments Page</u>: Easy access one stop shop for Vendors to access what they need when doing business with the State
 - <u>Agency Operations</u>: Contains information specific for agency customers and it replaces the page that was previously named 'Financial Guidance for State Agencies'
 - <u>Debt Collection</u>: Consolidates debt collection and write off information.
 - <u>Home Page</u>: Provides agencies easier access to the information they use routinely.

We are excited about these improvements and are hopeful this will be a more user-friendly navigation experience for our customers. This project would not have been completed without the hardworking and dedicated A&A Website Administrators, Cindy Terry and Heather Dunbar!



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
LOCAL GOVERNMENT FINANCIAL REPORTING BY MARK MERRY

For more than thirty years, DFS maintained a not so user friendly black and green screen financial reporting system for local governments. The filed annual financial reports were essentially spreadsheet templates with limited financial information supported by annual audit reports that were either sent through email as attachments or in some cases mailed to DFS as hardcopies. The system did not have a public facing side and DFS and other users, experienced difficulties with the very limited reporting and search capability.



Effective July 1, 2018, Section 218.32, Florida Statutes, was amended to allow DFS to implement an interactive repository for local government financial reporting. The Legislative intent was to have a robust system where the 2600+ local governments can file their financial statement audit reports and their statutorily required annual financial reports on-line with the system serving as central repository for local government reporting. There was one caveat however, the enabling legislation required that the annual financial reports had to be in an XBRL format and must meet the validation requirements of a relevant taxonomy.

DFS contracted with a vendor to produce the taxonomy. The work was completed in December 2021 and most local



xonomy. The work was completed in December 2021 and most local governments were able to file their fiscal year 21/22 annual reports by the statutory required June 30, 2023 reporting deadline.

In the development of the XBRL taxonomy, DFS provided the local governments two options:

- File in a newly developed spreadsheet template and the system would convert the data into the required XBRL format or
- DFS would provide them the taxonomy and they could file directly in XBRL.

By providing options, DFS made it much easier for many of the local governments to meet the statutory mandate and at the same time not create an extra financial burden.

Members of the public who enjoy researching local government financial information will find the system to be very user friendly. It allows the

development of special reports and has the capability to search financial information within individual local governments or across several local governments. As we move forward to the future, we are developing visual drill down capability where a user can start with a county and drill down to municipalities or special districts with that county. There will also be the development of charts and graphs for comparing local governments.

TAX SEASON: FORM 1099S BY APRIL MCBRAYER

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The Bureau of Vendor Relations Vendor Management Team is responsible for annually issuing Form 1099s to Payees who have received more than \$600 from the State of Florida within each tax/calendar year. The amounts reported on the Form 1099 are for specific types of transactions, such as the payment of services, legal and medical fees. The combination of the object code on the payment transaction and the vendor's business designation determines if the payment is Form 1099 reportable. If an incorrect object code is used on a payment transaction, it can result in a vendor receiving or not receiving a Form 1099.

To determine if an object code is Form 1099 reportable, refer to the 1099 Reportable column on the Statewide Object Code list available online.

Over 10,000 Form 1099s generated each year:

- Tax Year 2021: 11,608
- Tax Year 2022: 10,195
- Tax Year 2023: 11,849



Form 1099s are generated in January and released to the Payee by January 31 in compliance with IRS guidelines. Corrections to Form 1099s are initiated by agencies through the 1099 Correction Form (DFS-A1-2086) and approved by the Bureau of Vendor Relations. During these meetings, A&A shares a potential policy direction and seeks input on how the potential policy may benefit/affect the agency. Conversations have been beneficial and agency accounting and financial reporting subject matter expert feedback is helping to shape the financial policy that will be implemented with the Florida PALM Financial and Payroll implementation.

Topics discussed by the workgroup to date include:



- Period closing
- Reconciliation between systems
- Redacting confidential or sensitive information
- GL adjustments
- Requiring grant ID to support CMIA reporting
- Supplier records
- Advance payments
- Contracts using generic suppliers
- Processing times for rush items
