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DoD 101: About the Military

- Six Branches

1. Army
2. Navy
3. Marine Corps
4. Air Force
5. Space Force
6. Coast Guard (Falls under Homeland Security in times of peace, but DoD in war or when assigned to a military unit.)



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DoD 101: About the military

- Active Duty



- Wears the uniform and responsibilities 24/7, 365

- Reserves



- Wears the uniform two days a month (one weekend) and two weeks out of the year unless called to active service

- Florida National Guard



- National Guard Units are in all 50 states and 5 territories
- Wears the uniform two days a month (one weekend) and two weeks out of the year unless called to active duty service (Works for state. Only in federal service when on federal orders.)

Understanding the Military Culture



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1. Discipline and military culture deeply impact student veterans
2. Military encourages group identification rather than individual and work in teams
3. An 18-year-old military member is not the same as peers



Understanding the Military Culture



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4. Military has strong sense of mission and clearly defined core values
5. Military focuses on loyalty, duty, selflessness, honor, respect, and integrity
6. Many former military members find civilian life lacking direction and purpose

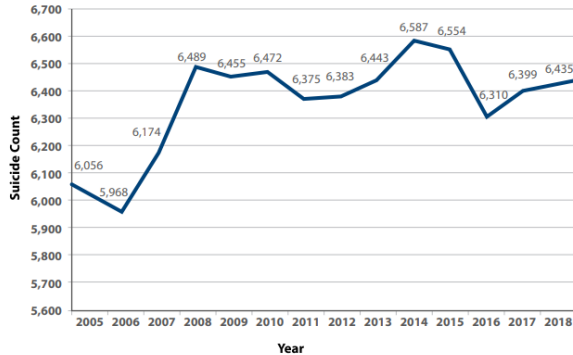

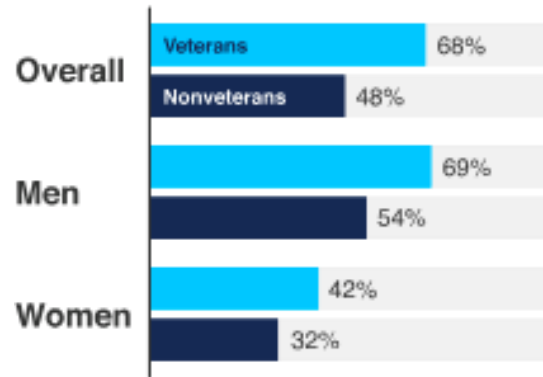

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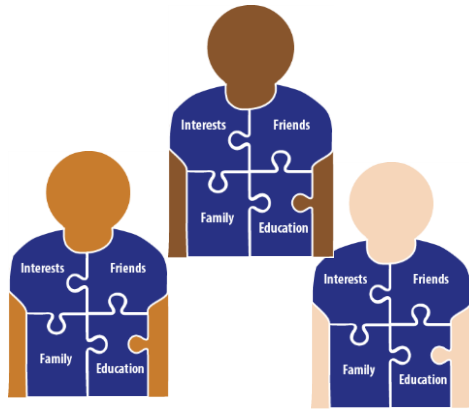

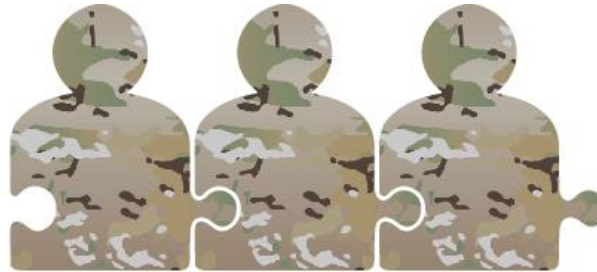

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Awareness: What Student Veterans want us to know

1. “We are having normal reactions to an abnormal experience.”
2. “No two veterans are alike.”
3. “Each of us has had different experiences.”
4. “DO NOT assume that you know my politics or beliefs just because I was in the military.”
5. “I may or may not be ready to talk about my experiences.”
6. “Trust can be an issue for me.”
7. “Being friendly and listening can go a long way toward building trust.”
8. “Please DO NOT be afraid of me.”
9. “We are accustomed to being successful and may be too proud to ask for help.”



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Awareness: Please do not generalize about Veterans

- The military is a reflection of society
- Not all are “broken”
 - Many have physical disabilities
 - Some have mental health issues
 - All are trying for a better life by getting an education

Tips to Better Serve Military Students



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Practicing Flexibility

- Being flexible is the key
 - Military members typically do not have a choice when called upon to deploy
 - They want to continue their classes
 - They want to finish college, but have to balance commitment to service, family, and school



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Requirement-8 Keys to Veterans' Success

- Understand the "8 Keys to Veterans' Success"
 - A voluntary initiative through the Departments of Education, Veterans Affairs, and Department of Defense.
 - Highlights specific ways that colleges and universities can support veterans.



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Requirement-8 Keys to Veterans' Success (Continued)

1. Create a **culture of trust and connectedness** across the campus community to promote well-being and success for Veterans.
2. Ensure **consistent and sustained support from campus leadership**.
3. Implement an **early alert system** to ensure all veterans receive academic, career, and financial advice before challenges become overwhelming.
4. **Coordinate and centralize campus efforts for all Veterans**, together with the creation of a designated space for them (even if limited in size).

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Requirement-8 Keys to Veterans' Student Success (Continued)

5. Collaborate with local communities and organizations, including government agencies, to align and coordinate various services for Veterans.
6. Utilize a uniform set of data tools to collect and track information on Veterans, including demographics, retention, and degree completion.
7. Provide comprehensive professional development for faculty and staff on issues and challenges unique to Veterans.
8. Develop systems that ensure sustainability of effective practices for Veterans.
